In the same way a Levite who came to the place saw him, and passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan traveller who came upon him was moved with compassion when he saw him. Next day, he took out two denarii and handed them to the innkeeper. "Look after him," he said, "and on my way back I will make good any extra expense you have." Dear Friends,

In today's Gospel, a religious leader who knew the Jewish religious laws and practices tries to test Jesus (in His knowledge of the Jewish Law). But Jesus uses the question to teach us how to love God and how to treat each other. When the lawyer asks: "And who is my neighbour?" Jesus reminds him of the true meaning of "neighbour". The Jewish leaders had narrowed the meaning of neighbour to include only those who belonged to the Jewish community. But Jesus extends it to include all people, even their enemies. This is because love should have no bounds; it cannot be restricted to race, colour or creed. In the story, only the Samaritan is neighbour to the man who "fell into the hands of brigands". It is the Samaritan who "went up and bandaged his wounds, pouring oil and wine on them, lifting him onto his mount, carried him to the inn and looked after him" and paid for his care. The story shows: "God's goodness to us, and our goodness to one another can only have one measure: God's love for us. This is His new commandment: "that we love one another as He has loved us".

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus teaches us, that it is not enough to **know** that we should be a neighbour to anyone in need. The challenge is to **be** a neighbour to those in need by showing them hospitality and compassion. If we refuse to open our eyes and our hearts to the needs of others and go to their help we may be acting like the priest and the Levite in today's story. (Jesus reminds us that we are all called to treat those around us who are in need with a practical loving kindness. Several years ago, Fr Hans, one of our Salesian missionary priests returned to Melbourne from Pakistan to undergo specialised medical treatment. While in Australia he was very keen to speak to anyone about his work. In Lahore, Pakistan, he was instrumental in building a technical school for boys. While visiting my Salesian Community at Lysterfield, Fr Hans told us a story of one of his experiences while teaching at the technical school. He said, "Pakistan is a very poor Muslim country. There are many local terrorists who terrorise the people. It is also a very dangerous place to be for non Muslims. Christians are few in number and are often persecuted. Fr Hans risked his life every day while there but he willingly and gladly worked for the good of the young people who came to the technical school to learn a trade. The technical school was built for those young people who came from Christian families. After two years he decided to accept 2 Muslim boys at the school. But some of the Christian boys treated them badly. One day he noticed that one of the Muslim boys came to school by bicycle but left on foot. When he asked him why he was returning home on foot the boy told him that the Christian boys flattened the bicycle tyres. The next day he spoke to the whole school saying: "You call yourselves Christian and you behave like that?" "Do you think you are following Jesus? Jesus would not have done something like that. He taught us to love our enemies. Why then are you interfering with this boy's bicycle?" All the boys did not dare to look up while he spoke as they felt ashamed of their actions. They understood that they had acted foolishly and did not do it again. Furthermore, the two Muslim boys made many friends at the school and they fitted in very well". Let us asks Our Lady, the Mother of Jesus to help us be a neighbour to anyone in need so that we may gain eternal life.




