

Dear Friends,

The Gospel is about riches. Everything that we have and everything that we are, are gifts from God. All that is good comes from God. Riches

come from God. But these riches may become a trap for us if we become greedy and selfish. When they become more important than our love for God and for others we forget that they are God's gifts to be shared with all especially with those in need. What makes riches like money good or bad is how we use them. If we use them to help others and to make friends then they are good. But often they can make us greedy and selfish; when this happens riches separate us from the love of God and of others. This is why they can be an evil. In the Gospel, Jesus speaks about the steward



who was wasteful with his master's property. He warns us of the real danger of putting our trust in money. For those who follow Jesus, love of God comes first and everything else comes second. This means that we must love God and serve Him in those around us. Riches should help us to do this. But sometimes our love of money blinds us from the love and the service we owe to one another and to God. The Gospel ends with the words of Jesus: "No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave of both God and of money." Jesus warns us to use our riches well and not to become slaves of money. If we do so, God will reward us with everlasting life and we will make true friends in this life and in the life to come. May the Virgin Mary, Mother of God help us always to put our trust in Her Son, Jesus. And may God remove the greed and selfishness in our hearts and help us to be servants of Him above all and of one another for love of God.
