# First Reading Ex 17:8-13

A reading from the book of Exodus The Amalekites came and attacked Israel at Rephidim. Moses said to Joshua, 'Pick out men for yourself, and tomorrow morning march out to engage Amalek. I, meanwhile, will stand on the hilltop, the staff of God in my hand.' Joshua did as Moses told him and marched out to engage Amalek, while Moses and Aaron and Hur went up to the top of the hill. As long as Moses kept his arms raised, Israel had the advantage; when he let his arms fall, the advantage went to Amalek. But Moses arms grew heavy, so they took a stone and put it under him and on this he sat, Aaron and Hur supporting his arms, one on one side, one on the other; and his 'arms remained' firm till sunset. With the edge of the sword Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

# Second Reading 2 Tm 3:14 – 4:2

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to Timothy You must keep to what you have been taught and know to be true; remember who your teachers were, and how, ever since you were a child, you have known the holy scriptures - from these you can learn the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All scripture is inspired by God and can profitably be used for teaching, for refuting error, for guiding people's lives and teaching them to be holy. This is how the man who is dedicated to God becomes fully equipped and ready for any good work.

Before God and before Christ Jesus who is to be judge of the living and the dead, I put this duty to you, in the name of his Appearing and of his kingdom: proclaim the message and, welcome or unwelcome, insist on it. Refute falsehood, correct error, call to obedience – but do all with patience and with the intention of teaching.

# Dear Friends,

The readings today are about prayer and the need to pray always. In all our needs and difficulties, we should pray

constantly and trust in God's love and mercy. Both persistent prayer and trust in God are important. Prayer is not magic. It is not like making a wish and after clicking our fingers, blinking our eyes or twitching our noses our wish comes true. Prayer is not asking and receiving what we want. It is laving ourselves open to God and His gifts, whatever they may be. Prayer is opening our hearts to God and allowing His gift of Love to fill them.



In the Gospel, Jesus tells the story of the unjust judge who eventually gives in to the

widow's request for justice. He does not do this because he cares for her but to stop her from coming back to him to ask for 'her just rights'. He says to himself, "Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for man, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will persist in coming and worrying me to death." The widow is successful because she is persistent, and does not give up until she has obtained her rights.

Jesus uses this story to make the point that turning to God in prayer is turning to a Judge who will always answer the prayers of those who ask. Unlike the unjust judge He will not delay. But, we should place our needs continually and persistently before our loving God and not be discouraged, even if it takes a long time for our prayer to be answered. He will, without a doubt, give freely to those who approach Him. Sometimes God's answer to our prayers may not be as we might expect. God knows what is best for us and always answers our prayers in His own mysterious way. May the Virgin Mary Mother of God pray to Jesus for all.
