St. John the Baptist

The Parish has been entrusted to the Salesians of Don Bosco since 2000

Dear Friends,

Many years ago, Br Jim, a Salesian, told me this story. When he was 16 years old he wanted to be a Salesian priest. He was sent to England to do his priestly training, because at that time it was not possible for him here in Australia. His mother was very proud of him. When he arrived in England with two other Australian seminarians, Fr Berwick, the priest in charge of their formation, asked Jim to learn a trade, as part of his training. He chose carpentry. One day while Jim was using a cutting tool to make a key-hole into the wood, the blade broke. The other students in the same class asked him if he was going to own up and report the damage. Jim replied, "Obedience is a mother and a shield," I will be obedient and report it to Fr Berwick.' He went to his office, knocked on the door and went in. "What is it, Jim?" the priest asked in a soft voice. Jim replied, "I broke the blade I was using in the workshop." "You should be more careful, young Jim," he replied. "Go now." But before Jim left his office, Fr Berwick called him back and said. "As punishment, please say 3 Hail Mary's." When he got back to the workshop his fellow students asked, "What did he say?" Jim replied, "3 Hail Mary's and a caution not to do it again." A few days later, the same thing happened.... Jim was given 10 Hail Marvs as punishment.

To cut a long story short, less than 2 weeks later, again the same thing happened to Jim. He broke

another blade. The other students were watching to see if he would report it again. It was also at this time when a number of students were being sent home because they were not suitable for religious life. Jim was worried and scared that he would be sent home too. This would be a big disappointment not only for him but also for his mother, he thought. It took him two and a half days to decide whether or not to report the breakage to Fr Berwick. Finally, he decided to report it, thinking to himself, "If I am sent home at least I have been honest about it." When Fr Berwick saw him again in his office, he lifted up his eves and before Jim could speak he said, "Not again, Jim?" "Yes Father," he sheepishly replied. Jim was not sent home as he thought he would be. But, before he left his office, Fr Berwick gave him the 5 Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary, punishment. Perhaps, one of the reasons he became a Salesian Brother and was not sent home was that at least he was honest.

I think this story shows that if we are humble, God can work wonders in our lives. In today's Gospel account of the Baptism of the Lord, John the Baptist wants to stop Jesus being baptised because he recognises that Jesus is the Messiah, the Chosen One of God. But Jesus humbles Himself before John the Baptist and says, "Let us humble ourselves and co-operate with God's plan because, I have come not to do my will but the will of my Father."
