It is this: in my preaching, to be able to offer the Good News free, and not insist on the rights which the gospel gives me. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessings.



Gospel Mk 1:29-39

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them. That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was. In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

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6th & 7th February 2020 - 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year B

Dear Friends,

On this Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time the Word of God invites us to reflect on the problem of suffering in the light of our faith. It also prepare us for the World Day of the Sick, celebrated annually on 11th of February.

In the first reading, The Author of the Book of Job argues that the whole of humanity throughout history experiences illusion and grief. If we reflect on our lives we can see that this is true. Job says, "Remember that my life is but a breath, and that my eyes will never again see joy." But what scandalises the author of the Book of Job and is a problem for him is the fact that suffering also happens to innocent persons. That is, it is the innocent who suffer.

Job shouts in rebellion and asks God for an explanation. But he cannot have an explanation because the ways of God are beyond human understanding and remain a mystery. Even the suffering of the just and innocent person form a part of God's providential Plan. The answer to Job's question: "Why does the innocent and just person suffer" is answered in Jesus, the Son whom God the Father sends into the world. Jesus comes near to those who suffer. He shares the lot of the poor, the sick and those who are excluded from society. He also frees them from their sicknesses. The Gospel of Mark states: "He cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils".

However, Jesus does not eliminate suffering; He takes it on Himself and personally experiences fully the suffering of others. His suffering, brings about the salvation of humanity, willed by God the Father. With Him suffering becomes a source and instrument of salvation.

This is the good news that Jesus brings: God the Father loves us and wants all to be saved. Therefore, faith in Jesus, does not free us from suffering. But, "the certainty of future immortality and hope in the promised resurrection cast new light on the mystery of suffering and death, and fill the believer with an extraordinary capacity to trust fully in the plan of God" St Pope John Paul II, Evangelium Vitae

Archbishop Julian Porteous has provided the following recommendation: "The Priest says the prayer for blessing the ashes. He sprinkles the ashes with holy water, without saying anything. Then he addresses all those present and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: "Repent, and believe in the Gospel", or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return". The Priest then cleanses his hands and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who are standing in their places. The Priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything."
