Say to all faint hearts, 'Courage! Do not be afraid. 'Look, your God is coming, vengeance is coming, the retribution of God; he is coming to save you.' Then the eyes of the blind shall be opened, the ears of the deaf unsealed, then the lame shall leap like a deer and the tongues of the dumb sing for joy; for water gushes in the desert, streams in the wasteland, the scorched earth becomes a lake, the parched land springs of water.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 145:7-10. R. v.1 (*R.*) Praise the Lord, my soul!

Second Reading Jas 2:1-5

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that? Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Acclamation cf. Mt 4:23

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom and healed all who were sick. Alleluia!

Gospel Mk 7:31-37

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha,' that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'

Dear Friends,

In today's first reading we hear the prophet Isaiah's enthusiastic promise that someone is coming who will open the eyes of the blind, unseal the ears of the deaf, cure the lame and make the dumb speak.

Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled when God becomes man in Jesus Christ—and in today's gospel we see an incident where using the rather strange techniques of Jewish and Greek healers of the time, he cures a deaf person and is acclaimed as Messiah.

In 2018 we need a messiah, a saviour as much as people needed one 2000 years ago. We need one who will open **our** ears: open them to the eternal wisdom of the Father - but also open them to the cries of people in need whom we are well able to help. We need a saviour who will open our eyes: open them to the everlasting truth of Christ's teachings - but also open them to the plight of the homeless in our society. We need a saviour who will loosen the bonds of our tongues: loosen them so that in our words we can proclaim the goodness of God - but also so that our tongues will be ready to speak words of kindness and not of hurt, words of forgiveness and not of spite, words of encouragement and support rather than words of mockery.

St James tells us in today's second reading that its not so much our individual physical problems like blindness or deafness that count, but our indifference to those who are down-trodden in our society. We should be protesting about our government's callous treatment of asylum seekers.



Alone among the countries of the western world Australia incarcerates asylum seekers for more than a few weeks. Many, including children have been confined to the island of Nauru for five years, facing the prospect of indefinite detention for the "crime" of fleeing religious persecution and seeking a better life. Criminals convicted of manslaughter, and armed robbery often cop a lighter sentence! We treat fellow humans this way as a deterrent to show other would-be asylum seekers the brutality that awaits them. St James criticizes our double standards.

As we celebrate our Mass together today let us ask God to forgive any of our words or actions which have not contributed to peace and harmony. Let us ask for the courage to raise our voices against injustice, to change us from being crippled inside into a people who are a sign that the Messiah has come and is active among us.

Wishing you a rejuvenating Spring-time and all God's blessings.
