Dear friends, on this 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday of Easter, we get the sense Jesus is preparing his disciples for the time where they will no longer see him. The risen Christ promises them and us a place in his kingdom if we follow his way and live in union with him. The Gospel is especially comforting in this time of pandemic marked by uncertainty and isolation on many levels: "Do not let your hearts be troubled, trust in God still and trust in me. There are many rooms in my Father's house...... I shall return to take you with me, so that where I am you may be too."

This passage is often used in funerals as a source of comfort and reassurance for those who mourn that their loved one is now in a better place with God. But these are also words of challenge for us to form welcoming communities and live life to the full even in this time. God's radical hospitality, expressed in the many rooms in God's house, invites us to actively make room for the marginalised, the excluded, the vulnerable, and the outsider. This is seen in our first reading in the book of Acts. In the growth of the early Church, some 'local' members were favoured over the foreigners, mainly the vulnerable widows who were neglected or unjustly treated. When this was brought to light, special ministers (deacons) were elected to specially look after the poor.

Who are the excluded in this time of pandemic? I think of the people who worked in this country but excluded from government assistance because they are non-citizens, temporary visitors, foreign students and workers. The latter have been even told to go home. I also think of those who have suffered racist attacks or ostracised for transmitting the virus to others. We are challenged to do better because 'there are many rooms in God's

house.' As Jesus prepares a place for His disciples, we are also called to make a place for others. I am also conscious of all those who are in isolation and not able to access the internet to feel connected to the parish. Our friendly phone callers have done an immense job to reach out to them, and so too, many who check in on each other through the week.

In this time of staying home, we are invited to be also 'at home' in our sense of belonging to God, so that nothing deters us from living each day with passion and power. We nurture this with prayer, as well as by growing in awareness we do have a common home in this world we need to care for. As promised, I like to share some nuggets of wisdom from *Laudato Si*. The name means "Praise be" and comes from the beginning of St Francis of Assisi's beautiful canticle of creation: "Praised be You, my Lord, with all Your creatures, especially Sir Brother Sun, Who is the day and through whom You give us light...Praised be You, my Lord, through Sister Moon and the stars, in heaven You formed them clear and precious and beautiful." Our Sister Mother Earth now cries out to us, reminding us of the harm to us when we commercialise and commodify nature as something to exploit and consume.

The structure of the encyclical follows a typical process found within Catholic Social Teaching: See, Judge and Act. To see is to have a deeper understanding of the ecological crisis we live in and this is described in detail in chapter 1. The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development (LS #13) and for a new dialogue with how we are shaping the future of the planet (LS #14). Climate change is a global problem with grave implications: environmental, social, economic, political and for the distribution of goods (LS #25) and these are elaborated in sub-sections of the chapter. They cover pollution, waste and a throwaway culture; the scarcity of clean drinking water; the loss of biodiversity, a decline in quality of living and global inequality. The major contribution of *Laudato Si* in this First chapter is to describe this as a spiritual crisis and an issue of climate justice: "A true ecological approach *always* becomes a social approach; it must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear *both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor (LS #49)*.

Finally, we like to remember all mothers and stepmothers, grandmothers and godmothers on this Mother's Day weekend, especially those who are older and self-isolating, those in nursing homes that we cannot visit just yet, single mums and those struggling to home-school their children in this time, those who are far away and those who are no longer with us. We like to celebrate you! Mother's Day started off as an anti-war movement in America in the 19<sup>th</sup> century before it became in the 1900s a day of honouring the sacrifices mothers made for their children, in response to the bias at the time toward male achievements. The holiday has since been commercialised to become a season for consumer spending. In this time of social isolation, perhaps we can return to more modest yet still special ways of showing love and gratitude for our mums and the mother figures in our lives.

I keep all of you in my prayers, especially those suffering most greatly, and I ask you, please, to pray for me. I thank you, and with great affection I send you my blessing.

## <u>First Prayer</u>

O Mary, You shine continuously on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope. We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick, who, at the foot of the cross, were united with Jesus' suffering, and persevered in your faith.

Protectress of all people, you know our needs, and we know that you will provide, so that, as at Cana in Galilee, joy and celebration may return after this time of trial.

Help us, Mother of Divine Love,

to conform ourselves to the will of the Father and to do what Jesus tells us. For he took upon himself our suffering, and burdened himself with our sorrows to bring us, through the cross, to the joy of the Resurrection. Amen.

Mother of God and our Mother, pray for us to God, the Father of mercies, that this great suffering may end and that hope and peace may dawn anew. Plead with your divine Son, as you did at Cana, so that the families of the sick and the victims be comforted, and their hearts be opened to confidence and trust.

Protect those doctors, nurses, health workers and volunteers who are on the frontline of this emergency, and are risking their lives to save others. Support their heroic effort and grant them strength, generosity and continued health.

Be close to those who assist the sick night and day, and to priests who, in their pastoral concern and fidelity to the Gospel, are trying to help and support everyone.

Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men and women engaged in scientific research, that they may find effective solutions to overcome this virus.

Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude and generosity, they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life and may devise social and economic solutions inspired by farsightedness and solidarity.

Mary Most Holy, stir our consciences, so that the enormous funds invested in developing and stockpiling arms will instead be spent on promoting effective research on how to prevent similar tragedies from occurring in the future.

Beloved Mother, help us realise that we are all members of one great family and to recognise the bond that unites us, so that, in a spirit of fraternity and solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless situations of poverty and need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer.

Mary, Consolation of the afflicted, embrace all your children in distress and pray that God will stretch out his all-powerful hand and free us from this terrible pandemic, so that life can serenely resume its normal course.

To you, who shine on our journey as a sign of salvation and hope, do we entrust ourselves, O Clement, O Loving, O Sweet Virgin Mary. Amen.








## **STEWARDSHIP**



# THE DISCIPLES ASKED JESUS HOW TO GET TO GOD. AND JESUS TOLD THEM: IT'S EASY! I AM THE WAY



Holy Scripture

#### A Reading from the Holy Gospel according to John


14:1-6
