70 BE ON EARTH THE HEART 07 GOD



We know from experience that those in authority are not always the people with the power. In an organisation the person who has been given the authority to lead can discover that the real power in the organisation belongs elsewhere, perhaps much further down the line. This is not always a good thing, especially when those with the power are using it in self-serving ways and trying to undermine the person with legitimate authority who wants to use power well.

The Gospel Reading today puts before us a meeting between two people, one who had been invested with great authority and another who had no authority at all. Pilate was the governor of Judea who had been entrusted with the authority of Caesar and worked to bring that authority to bear in a far-flung part of the Roman Empire. Jesus had no authority; he was without position or status, staring death by crucifixion in the face. Yet, of the two, it was Jesus who had the greater power. The influence of Jesus would turn out to be much more powerful than that of Pilate. Indeed, Pilate would have been no more than a footnote in history if Jesus had not been crucified on his watch.

The power of Jesus, as He stood before Pilate, was rooted in His intimate relationship with God. Jesus stands before Pilate as God incarnate, enfleshed Word. He alludes to this when He declares to Pilate that He has come into the world to bear witness to the truth, to God. Jesus lived and died to bear witness to God in whom there is no falsehood. The whole purpose of Jesus' life, death and resurrection was to reveal God who is truth. Jesus says of Himself in John's Gospel, 'I am the truth'. We could also say that Jesus came into the world

to bear witness to love, to reveal God who is love. It is above all in laying down His life that Jesus reveals the God who is love. As today's Second Reading says, Christ 'loves us and has washed away our sins with His blood'.

Because Jesus was truth incarnate and love incarnate, He had great power, even as He appeared helpless before Pilate. Jesus' power was not an oppressive power, but a liberating and life-giving power. He embodied the truth that sets free and gives expression to the love that brings life. We, His disciples, are called to be powerful in the sense in which Jesus was powerful. Jesus says to Pilate, 'all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice'. 'Those who listen to His voice', His disciples, are to be on the side of truth, on the side of love. We show ourselves to be the Lord's disciples by being truthful as Jesus was truthful, by loving as Jesus loved. Truth and love are two facets of God, and when we are truthful and loving people we show ourselves to be people of God, revealers of God as Jesus was, powerful in the way He was.

We are to hold together in our lives both the value of truth and the value of love, especially in the way we relate to people. Truth without love can be hard and harsh. Speaking the truth to people, without love, can leave them devastated and broken. If we truly care for people, we will only give them as much truth as they are capable of hearing at the time. Similarly, love without a commitment to truth can become overly indulgent. Loving others can mean at times helping them to see something that they need to see but have become blind to. The letter to the Ephesians puts it well when it states: 'Speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ'. Because Christ was the perfect expression of truth and love, whenever we live truthful and loving lives we grow up into Christ. Growing up into Christ is our Baptismal calling; it is a calling that engages us for the whole of our earthly lives. It is only in the next life that we will grow fully into Christ, when, in the words of Paul's letter to the Romans, we will be conformed to the image of God's Son.

Today's Feast calls on us to grow as disciples of Christ the King by bearing witness to the way of truth and love that Jesus embodied. Today's Second Reading speaks of Jesus as the faithful witness. He witnessed faithfully to the God who sent him into the world, to truth and to love. He lived in this world but He bore witness to another world, to God's world, to the values of God's kingdom. His faithful witness often brought him into conflict with those in authority, like Pilate.

We too are called to be faithful witnesses as Jesus was. Like Jesus we are immersed in this world; we are children of our present-day culture, and, yet, are called to witness to God's world which can never be fully identified with the world in which we live. We are to witness to the values of God's kingdom even as we live under various forms of earthly authority. We are to be truthful in a world where secrecy and deceit can be rampant; we are to be self-giving in a world that often promotes self-serving. This will often mean taking the more difficult path, as it did for Jesus. Yet, we have His assurance that His path is the path of life. We are following a King who is the Way, the Truth and the Life.

POLISH NEWS

O klękaniu i przyknękaniu w kościele

Błogosławiony Jan XXIII powiedział kiedyś: człowiek nigdy nie jest tak wielki, jak wtedy, gdy klęczy. Postawa klęcząca wyraża naszą małość, ale także cześć, uwielbienie, podziw i miłość wobec Boga, przed którym stajemy.

W liturgii kościoła możemy wyróżnić dwa rodzaje klękania. Pierwszy to

przyklęknięcie, czyli klęknięcie na moment, na jedno kolano. Przyklękamy przechodząc przed tabernakulum, w którym ukryty jest eucharystyczny Jezus. Musimy pamiętać, że tabernakulum nie zawsze jest umieszczone pośrodku kościoła za ołtarzem. Czasami będzie umiejscowione gdzieś z boku. W jego odnalezieniu pomoże nam tak zwana "wieczna lampka" – czerwone światełko nieustannie palące się w pobliżu miejsca przechowywania Najświętszego Sakramentu. Przyklękamy więc nie pośrodku kościoła, a przed tabernakulum. W ten sposób oddajemy cześć obecnemu w nim Jezusowi.

Jeśli przechodzimy przed ołtarzem, za którym nie ma tabernakulum pozdrawiamy ołtarz, jako święte miejsce, na którym dokonuje się ofiara przez wykonanie głębokiego skłonu.

Pięknym zwyczajem jest także przyklęknięcie, gdy na ulicy spotykamy kapłana, który idzie z Komunią do chorych lub umierających. Ma wtedy na sobie komżę i stułę, a na szyi zawieszoną bursę (czyli ozdobną "torebkę" na Najświętszy Sakrament), więc łatwo się zorientować.

ołtarzu znajduje się wystawiony do adoracji Najświętszy Sakrament lub gdyby zdarzyło się nam przechodzić przed ołtarzem podczas mszy już po konsekracji, wtedy także klękamy na oba kolana.

W ten sam sposób oddajemy cześć krzyżowi wystawionemu do adoracji w Wielki Piątek i Wielką Sobotę – od Liturgii męki Pańskiej aż do Wigilii Paschalnej. We wszystkie inne dni cześć krzyżowi oddajemy przez skłon.

Kiedy wchodzę do niewielkiej kaplicy lub przechodzę przed ołtarzem, za którym znajduje się tabernakulum, a obok ołtarza stoi krzyż, nie jest konieczne, bym wykonał jedno przyklęknięcie i dwa skłony. W jednym geście przyklęknięcia mogę wyrazić całą moją cześć i miłość. Nie ma wtedy potrzeby jeszcze dodatkowo się kłaniać. Nie są to bowiem gesty magiczne, ale gesty miłości.

Przyklękanie i klękanie nie są obowiązkowe (zwłaszcza w sytuacji gdy wiek lub stan zdrowia. Nieprzyklęknięcie przed tabernakulum nie jest grzechem. Tak samo jak grzechem nie jest, gdy nie powiem komuś "dzień dobry" albo "dziękuję". To "tylko" brak kultury. Nikogo nie trzeba chyba przekonywać, że warto umieć zachować się przy stole. Przy Stole Pańskim również.
