FROM THE PASTOR

SAY WHAT YOU'RE LOOKING AT

Today we are attempting to choose leaders in an era when we have never needed leadership more. One right step and the whole world can become new again. One more wrong step and the globe itself is in irreversible danger. The question is, then, How shall these new leaders lead so that the errors of the last generation do not simply become even more death-dealing?

A child's insight can help. In this classic story, a village is awaiting a visit from the emperor: every year he came regally dressed, resplendent in velvet and gold, to demonstrate how great an emperor he was. People lined the streets for miles and shouted as the emperor strode by, "You are the greatest emperor of all." But one year a small child in the crowd, shocked by what he saw, shouted even louder: "No, No," he said. "Look! The emperor has no clothes at all." Then the farce was over. Then the crowd went silent. Then everyone snuck away ashamed of what they had allowed to go unchallenged. And then the emperor resigned the throne.

Lesson one: If we want to lead the world through bad times to good, we must be truth-tellers. "If you want to save the age," the poet Brenda Kennelly writes, "betray it. Expose its conceits, its foibles and its phony moral certitudes." There will be those among the powerful who try to make us say what we know is clearly not true because, if everyone agrees to believe the lie, the lie can go on forever.

The lie that there is:

- nothing we can do about refugees except close our borders
- nothing we can do about world poverty
- nothing we can do about "free" trade
- nothing we can do about inequality and justice
 nothing we can do to provide education and health care, housing and food, roads and
 water and just wages for everyone in the world.

If we want to lead this world, we, too, must refuse to tell the old lies. We must learn to say with certainty and clarity: Those emperors have no clothes! We must, like the child in the story, see what we're looking at and say what we see!

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"WITH REFUGEES"

This weekend marks the ends of Refugee Week 2019. This week commenced last Sunday, 16th June and concluded on Saturday, 22nd June. This is an annual event which promotes positive images of refugees and celebrates the valuable contribution refugees make to Australian society. Australia has an extensive history of successfully resettling refugees and humanitarian entrants. Since Federation, Australia has welcomed more than 800,000 refugees and those in need of humanitarian protection, offering a permanent home.

In the past, Australia has assisted refugees from many parts of the world. Following the Second World War, most came from countries such as Germany, Poland and Ukraine. In the 1950s, we saw people arriving from Hungary and in the 1960s many came from Czechoslovakia. In the 1970's, people started coming from Indochina (Vietnam) and Latin America (Chile and El Salvador), and these groups continued to arrive well into the 1980's. The 1990's were dominated by the Balkan War, with a large number of people arriving from the Middle East and South Asia during this decade. Many of these people were from ethnic and religious minority groups or opponents of the Taliban regime in Afghanistan or Saddam Hussein's regime in Iraq. In the 2000s, the majority of entrants coming in under the Refugee and Special Humanitarian Program came from Africa, in particular Sudan and towards the end of the decade from Burma and Bhutan. In the recent years, resettled refugees have come predominantly from Iraq, Burma and Bhutan, Afghanistan, Syria and Congo.

The term 'refugee', 'asylum seeker' and 'migrant' are often used interchangeably, particularly in the media. However there are important distinctions in their definitions. Refugees are forced to flee from their country and cannot return unless their situation that forced them to leave improves. Some are forced to flee without any warning; many have experienced torture and trauma. The motivating factor for refugees is safety and protection from persecution and human rights abuse, not economic advantage. A person seeking asylum is a person who is seeking protection as a refugee and is still waiting to have his/her claim assessed. Every refugee has at some point been a person seeking asylum. A migrant is someone who chooses to leave their country to seek a better life. They choose where they migrate to and they are able to return whenever they like.

Irrespective of who, 'refugee', 'asylum seeker' or 'migrant' they all need our respect and our love as our neighbours.




AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC YOUTH FESTIVAL (ACYF) - PERTH 6TH - 11TH DECEMBER 2019

How is God calling us to be a Christ-centred Church in Australia that is missionary and evangelising?


As we move into this second stage of the Plenary Council journey, we continue to seek the wisdom of the Holy Spirit.

Beginning in July 2019, we are called to reflect on Scripture, Church teaching and our contemporary situation in order to discern the answer to this question. The fruits of what is discerned during this time will help shape the agenda of the first session of Plenary Council in October 2020.

This National Theme for Discernment is inspired by the voices of the People of God who shared a passion for participating in the missionary nature of the Church and desire stronger support, involvement and formation among all the baptised who make up the Church. The data also identified the need to reach out and communicate more effectively and to find new ways of living and proclaiming the Gospel in Australia today. There was a call for the strengthening of leadership and ministries in parishes and schools, training to equip leaders for ministry, pastoral support for various

groups within parish and faith communities, social issues such as life and religious and a desire for a unified voice in engaging freedom.
