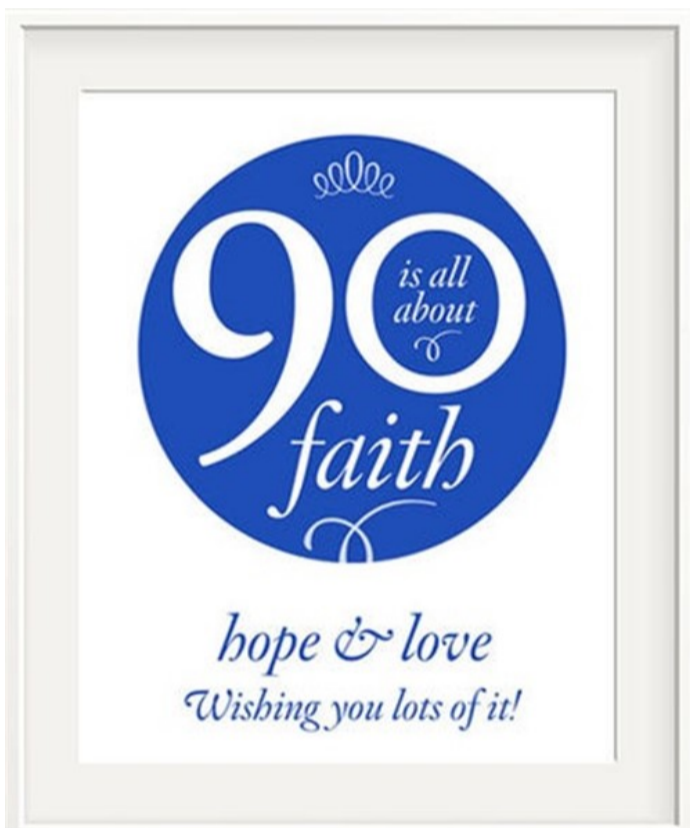

Dear friends, this weekend we celebrate an amazing milestone in the parish and school – our 90th anniversary of foundation! We celebrate 90 years of faith, hope and love; of community, education and ministry; of mission and outreach in Moonah and beyond. There is much to be in awe and gratitude for. Our response echoes that of the psalmist (Ps125): *The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy!*

Reading through the history of the founding of St Therese's in Moonah, I was taken by the many who have contributed both financially and spiritually to growing this community, both religious and laity. If you get a chance, I highly recommend the history display we have put up with the

school in the hall. The number of mementos, photos, awards and ornaments will send anyone down memory lane and some of you would also recognise the many colourful personalities who once passed through our way. The booklet '**90 years young**' diligently prepared and compiled by Colin Dennison from our parish is worth purchasing and reading. We stand on the shoulders of many giants in faith and leadership to get to where we are today as a parish and school community, and we celebrate them.

Fittingly, our Readings remind us not to be complacent and constantly look out for those in need. The prophet Jeremiah (31:7-9) describes a vision of life after exile with people scattered far and wide now returning home, and they included the blind and lame, those expecting and with children! This names for us the people often overlooked, disregarded and devalued; and the inclusivity of God's care that calls us to do the same. Similarly in the Gospel (Mk 10:46-52), the blind beggar Bartimaeus was considered a 'nobody' as he sat by the roadside. The crowds tried to silence his cry for help, but Jesus embodied the way of compassion by asking him a liberating question: *'What do you want me to do for you?'*

At the opening of the two-year process of listening for the Church Synod 2021-2023, Pope Francis threw out a challenge: *'Let us not soundproof our hearts; let us not remain barricaded in our certainties...So often our certainties can make us closed. Let us listen to one*

another.' For Jesus, the cry of those pleading for help is not a nuisance but a challenge. How important it is to listen to each other and ask *'What do you want me to do for you?'*

In light of the UN climate change summit COP26 set to begin in Glasgow, Scotland in a week, I offer snippets on Brian Rowe's recent article in the National Catholic Reporter (dated 15 Oct 2021) on *'5 reasons why Catholics should care about the COP26 climate summit'*.

Reason #1: Pope Francis cares (as do many faith leaders)

On 4th October, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis convened nearly 40 religious leaders at the Vatican to sign a joint appeal to participants at COP26. The faith leaders also committed to take actions within their own religious communities by emphasising ecological education, raising awareness of climate science and taking measures to become more sustainable. Within the Catholic Church, those efforts are encapsulated within the *Laudato Si'* Action Platform, which is set to launch on 14th November, or just days after COP26 ends.

Reason #2: Paris Agreement wasn't the end, but a beginning

In 2015, nearly every nation on Earth adopted the Paris climate accord, where for the first time all countries committed to reducing their greenhouse gas emissions. But the Paris Agreement did not include specific measures of how to get there. Along with submitting new, more ambitious emissions-reduction pledges and the focus on the 1.5°C target, other issues on the table will be financing less-industrialised nations adapt to and mitigate climate change, and sending a clear signal the world is moving past the era of fossil fuels.

Reason #3: Catholic social teaching is on the table, especially for the poor

Name a principle of Catholic social teaching — from the dignity of every person, to solidarity and workers' rights — and it relates to discussions at COP26. Religious advocates stress the injustice that climate change presents: The people suffering most from global warming have contributed least to the problem and have fewer resources to adapt and respond.

Reason #4: The climate is not waiting for governments to agree

The six hottest years on record have occurred since 2015 when the Paris Agreement was reached, and many parts of the world have been hit by extreme weather, which scientists link to global warming. If countries continue to delay substantial cuts in emissions, economic costs, in addition to the toll on human life and biodiversity, are expected to only rise higher.

Reason #5: The pandemic connection

Although COVID-19 delayed the climate conference, many see the forced pause as an opportunity, especially for accelerating the global transition to clean energy necessary to achieve the 1.5°C target. Because of that, COP26 has taken on added importance, and how countries invest to re-boost their economies will be critical. Is it going to be spent on jobs which are green and sustainable? Is it going to put the poorest at the heart of that money?

POLISH NEWS

Marianna Popiełuszko - Matka świętego

Jej twarz znamy ze zdjęć, porwana zmarszczkami, naznaczona cierpieniem, ale pełna pokoju. Cieszyło ją bycie z ludźmi i zawsze znajdowała czas na rozmowę. Każdą okazję wykorzystywała, żeby przekazywać to, co według niej było sensem życia: „Najważniejsze to w Boga wierzyć i Boga mieć na pierwszym miejscu” rzuciła kiedyś na pożegnanie jednemu z biskupów. A dziennikarzom, którzy przyjechali do Okopów zobaczyć dom rodzinny przyszłego błogosławionego, wypaliła „Bez Boga to ni do proga. Czuwajcie, by był razem z wami, bo gdzie jest Bóg i wiara, tam i zwycięstwo będzie”.

Rytm życia Marianny Popiełuszko wyznaczały pory roku. Gospodarstwo było spore, kilkanaście hektarów, ale ziemia słaba. Codziennosc wypełniona była więc obowiązkami: sianie, plewienie, wyprowadzanie krów na pastwisko, gotowanie... Nawet w wysokiej ciąży nie przerywała pracy.

W niedzielę 14 września 1947 roku poszła jak co wieczór uporządzić krowy. Tam poczuła, że maleństwo w jej łonie pcha się na świat. Zdążyła jeszcze wrócić do domu, a już po kilku chwilach trzymała w ramionach syna, swoje trzecie dziecko. Przez całą ciążę modliła się o łaskę powołania dla dziecka – Alka. Ze zrozumieniem przyjęła decyzję syna, kiedy w seminarium zmienił imię na Jerzy. I choć w jej sercu na zawsze pozostał Alkiem, we wspomnieniach nie powiedziała o nim inaczej jak „ksiądz Jerzy”.

Modlitwa towarzyszyła jej przez cały czas. Uczyła dzieci klękać do niej zaraz po przebudzeniu i na kolanach kończyć dzień. Wychowywała je na szlachetnych, prawych ludzi. „Uczyłam, żeby nie mówić źle o innych

i dla każdego być dobrym”.

Kiedy po maturze Alek oznajmił rodzinie, że wstępuje do warszawskiego seminarium, jej serce opanowały sprzeczne uczucia: radość, że jej syn będzie księdzem, ale i ból, że od teraz będzie już daleko. „Oddałam go Kościołowi” powie, domagając się, aby spoczął tam, gdzie żył, pracował i cierpiał. Ale wcześniej, przez lata jego seminarium i kapłaństwa „oddałam go Kościołowi” będzie dla niej oznaczać rzadkie, krótkie spotkania, oddalenie i tęsknotę, a potem także lęk o jego życie. Przyjmowała to wszystko jako oczywistą, matczyną ofiarę. Pamiętała, że Jerzy podczas ostatnich odwiedzin niespodziewanie rzucił: „jakbym zginął, to tylko nie płaczcie po mnie”. Już wtedy ją zmroziło. Kiedy kilka tygodni później, 30 października 1984 roku, jechała zidentyfikować ciało swojego syna, wiedziała już, że te słowa były prorocze. I nie płakała, jej mąż głośno krzyczał, a ona siedziała jak skamieniała. I taka była przez cały czas, spokojna, nieruchoma. Łzy popłynęły dopiero, kiedy stanęła przy otwartej trumnie i zobaczyła zmalretowane ciało.

Po śmierci syna jej życie zmieniło się diametralnie. Spotykała wielkich tego świata: Margaret Thatcher, Georga Busha, Vaclava Havla. Pewnego dnia zbolałych rodziców przytulił Jan Paweł II. „Matko, dałaś światu wielkiego syna” – powiedział jej papież, ale ona natychmiast odpowiedziała „Ojciec Święty, nie ja dałam, ale Bóg dał przeze mnie światu”.

W końcu, 6 czerwca 2010 roku, doczekała chwili niezwykłej: na placu Piłsudskiego w Warszawie poprowadziła różaniec, modląc się z tysiącami zebranych tam ludzi, a po chwili słyszała, jak kardynał Angelo Amato ogłasza, że jej syn został włączony w poczet błogosławionych Kościoła. Marianna Popiełuszko odeszła 19 listopada 2013 r. Życzę wszystkim błogosławionego tygodnia.
