FROM THE PASTOR

THE DELUSION OF EVIL
THE TRAGEDY IN SRI LANKA

The world has been shocked and saddened by the violent evil we have witnessed in Sri Lanka, wantonly inflicted upon the innocents at prayer in Easter Masses at St Anthony's and St Sebastian's Catholic Churches and at a service at Zion Church, a Protestant congregation. Added to this carnage was the bombing of the Shangri-La Hotel, the Cinnamon Grand Hotel, The Kingsbury and the Tropical Inn. Two hundred and fifty-three innocent souls lost their lives on this most sacred day in the Christian year, with another five hundred injured, some of whom may not survive. As we recently signed and sent our letter of solidarity to the survivors in Christchurch, I invite you again to sign this letter of solidarity to the survivors in Sri Lanka...

To Our Brothers and Sisters in Christ at the Churches of St Anthony, St Sebastian and Zion, and our Brothers and Sisters at the Shangri-La, Cinnamon Grand, Kingsbury and Tropical Inn.

We, the congregation of St Therese's Catholic Church in Moonah, Tasmania, Australia, are deeply grieved by the violence and trauma you have suffered in the bombings on Easter Sunday. It shocked us as it shocked people all over the world, that such violence could be perpetrated against the innocent who were at prayer.

We pray in faith that all who died will be received by our Lord into the place He has prepared for those who love. We pray for all of you who are injured, that your recovery is effective and complete. And we pray for all of you who are traumatised and grieving. These will be the most difficult of injuries to heal. May the Lord touch the deepest part of your souls with peace.

You have borne in your families and communities, the Crucifixion of Good Friday on the most Sacred Day when we celebrate the Resurrection of Christ. We pray in solidarity with you and for you. And we pray for the conversion of hearts of those who sanctioned these actions. It was only a short time ago that we were shocked by a similar event in Christchurch, NZ, against innocent people at prayer. May we all be one.

May the God of Peace bless you all.

In the Heart of Christ

We grieve for these brothers and sisters in Christ as we grieved for our Muslim brothers and sisters when they, too, were slain in an unconscionable act of violence. All were innocent. It shocks and bewilders us as we wonder what mental and moral contortions one has to use to establish any justification in his or her mind for such an action. One can deduce that it is tribalism that cloaks itself in religion, and that the perpetrators have such a distorted image of a narrow god whom they have reduced to their own making, and that they are driven by a hatred that begets more hatred. Any reasonable person of any faith can see that there is no justification for the murder of innocents, and that such evil acts risk provoking further mindless reprisals without end. Yet these people are hardened fanatical fighters who have returned from the war they have lost in Syria and Iraq. They will be angry, with a belief that they have been denied what was rightfully theirs. Their anger is principally directed at the US and its allies who defeated them. That, therefore, principally targets Christians. Their ideology is narrow, absolute and intolerant of any other religious belief, even that of moderate, pluralist Muslims as well as Shia Muslims, all of whom they consider to be heretics. In their eyes, the end justifies the means.

While we must resist such fanaticism gaining power, our methods must be those of true justice and the rule of law. We are challenged by Christ to never pay back one wrong with another, and to "pray for those who persecute you". Our response must never descend to hatred, because hatred is what killed these innocents and Christ Himself. Ours must be the prayer of hope in the Resurrection which has already overcome, and for the perpetrators' conversion. We saw that beautiful declaration of forgiveness of the Australian murderer by the husband and father who lost his wife and child in Christchurch, NZ. May we all share this spirit of forgiveness, and arrive one day at true reconciliation.

PRAYERFUL CENTRING

Church as a community is central to who we are, so it is a good thing to get re-connected to each other at church. Church is also a praying community, so it is a spiritually helpful practice to prepare for the beginning of Mass in a way that focuses and centres us for the sacrament we are about to enter into. Thus, I thought we could introduce a brief time of prayer and silence before the Mass begins. We will begin it with a spoken prayer led by a member of the congregation, followed by a minute or two of silence before the entrance procession.

Many people do this now, but they are surrounded by much conversation. This will allow us to become centred and to also be mindful of others who are praying. We'll begin this after Easter.

Whenever we are in the body of the church, let us be mindful to maintain this reverent quietness, not suppressing all conversation but keeping it to a very low volume, so others can pray.



DOUBTING THOMAS

John 20:19-31

The readings that follow Easter are meant to help us deepens the faith experience of the Risen Christ. Together, the old and the newly baptised reflect on the risen Lord in our midst. Today's gospel is about ourselves. Each one of us must face the inevitable question: Who is Jesus for me? Or we can put the question as Jesus did: Whom do you say I am?

Today we proclaim a beatitude that affects us deeply: 'Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe' (v.29), because by faith we share in his life: 'so that through believing you may have life' (v.31). Our faith is translated into actions that generate life.

The resurrection did not impose itself as evidence. The appearances of the risen Jesus slowly impacted on the disciples' hearts. Faith opens us up to the risen presence of the Lord. The disciples rejoiced to see the Lord. But it was not simply for the sake of private intimate contemplation. These appearances were meant to give the disciples the power for their mission. 'As the Father sent me, so I am sending you' (v.21). The heart of this mission is forgiveness. Forgiveness frees us and gives us life.

Thomas struggled with that question and was so stubborn that he wanted physical proof of Jesus' resurrection. He would not

accept any cheap secondhand information. His struggle gives us an insight into our own nagging doubts. In our present world, there is so much violence and so many terrorist threats, that it is easy to ask the question: Where is a gracious and merciful God in all this mess?

Thomas was not present when Jesus first showed himself. 'Unless I see the holes the nails have made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they have made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' (v.25) His stubborn refusal to believe is the very attitude that Jesus had condemned throughout his life. The religious leaders had always demanded tangible proof from Jesus.

When Jesus appeared again, Thomas was with the others. Jesus singled him out. Thomas represents all of us who struggle with our faith.




