70 BE ON EARTH THE HEART OF GOD

Dear friends, we now live in a time where life and death are constantly in the news. Not surprisingly, we worry for and cherish much more our loved ones as we start to stay home and socially distance ourselves from larger public gatherings. Some have said such a time has been long coming when we can "reset" and truly come to value again how our health, families, relationships and solidarity with each other outweigh and outlast our selfish drives and the stresses we face. Yet there is also a growing fear and anxiety at what will happen next in Tasmania given the rampant and deadly spread of the virus in Europe and America, as well as on the mainland with its increasing number of cases from community transmission. There is a sense we are heading into a lockdown with most of the draconian measures already in place. Echoing the fragility of life, our gospel this weekend describes how the loss of a loved one is final and heartbreaking. Mary and Martha have lost their brother Lazarus and their grief was compounded by the fact that their good friend Jesus had missed the funeral. When he arrived, Mary and Martha cried out that if he had come earlier, Lazarus would not have died. And then, the impossible occurs: Jesus restored life to the dead man, and in doing so gave hope to the two grieving sisters, the village who mourned with them and us who listen to this gospel centuries later. This hope for more is rooted in a belief that Jesus loves us as much as he loved Lazarus and wept openly for him. His love transcends even death and gains for us eternal life.

This love proclaims the truth that Jesus is the lord of life. He has power to call us out of our tombs. We do not have to be physically dead to be raised up. The prophet Ezekiel boldly promised in our first reading: Thus, says the Lord, "I will open your graves and raise you from them". What a powerful image. Israel had just been overrun by Babylon (modern day Iraq) with its leaders and people abducted. Many were killed but majority were dispersed from their land, temple and customs which anchored their cultural identity. There was a real sense of feeling abandoned by God. We can similarly feel for the people now who are far from home in many ports and cities, unable to return because of attempts to stem the tide of Covid-19. Not sharing the people's despair, Ezekiel envisioned resurrection as a metaphor that promised hope of a new future back on home soil despite appearances to the contrary. Israel would be liberated from Babylon; metaphorically speaking, they would rise from their graves and come back to life. This promise was fulfilled by the next powerhouse Persia who defeated Babylon and allowed the Israelites to return home.

We can be dead in the midst of life when we remain indifferent to the plight of other people, when we choose to make life all about us in this time of pandemic. Is this not like living in a tomb? When Jesus came offering abundant life he wasn't just talking about release from our physical graves, but also the ruts that deaden us and have us living like self-absorbed robots instead of women and men alive with the spirit of God. What does resurrection in this context look like? To love one another, to see each other as God's beloved as we have been reminded in recent weeks that we are all connected and in this together. This life expresses itself especially now in moving towards a more loving, vulnerable, and authentic community that cares for each and every part of Christ's Body. Richard Rohr, a wise Franciscan spiritual guru said recently: We cannot face large-scale crises as individuals; we cannot carry the pain of this reality on our own, nor can we only look out for ourselves. The pain is communal and so too must be the response. The readings this weekend carry for us a timely message of hope and rebirth just when we are inclined to withdraw and despair. We are invited to be not passive onlookers at the tomb but to actively help to make resurrection possible by taking away the stone and unbinding people and freeing them. In this time of anxiety in which we are experiencing, let us respond with love and free each other from fear and indifference.

Because of the current stringent measures in place (that keep evolving), we are unable to open the church for visits, personal prayer, stations of the cross, adoration and reconciliation. We also have had to suspend all small group gatherings like the Lenten sharing group and RCIA. The only exceptions are for weddings and funerals with just the minimal number of people. We will continue to stay connected through the weekly bulletin and updates, as well as record the weekend mass to play from 9am Sunday. Do call us anytime (9412 8471) if you need any of those resources sent to you by mail, or if you like to receive the sacrament of reconciliation or a home visit. One of the things we can do powerfully together despite being physically apart is to pray. I invite you to join Michael and myself in prayer at 9am Monday to Saturday when we celebrate daily mass together behind closed doors. Join us to pray especially for the following intentions in our community and around the world:

The elderly, ill and dying
Medical personnel, carers and volunteers
The exiled, isolated and homeless
Priest, pastors and faith leaders
Political leaders, communicators and the operationally active
The unemployed, retrenched and those financially impacted
and anyone else you know who is especially hit by the current crisis.

Right now, a lot of us cannot *go* to church but, more than ever, we can *be* the church. The church is always at our best, not when things are going well, but when we respond in a Christ-like manner to difficult circumstances. That is our calling now. Let's step up and allow God to breathe new life!

Prayer for Spiritual Communion

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the most Holy Sacrament.

I love you above all things and I desire to receive you into my soul.

Since I cannot at this moment receive you sacramentally, come into my heart spiritually.

I embrace you as if you were already there, dwelling within me, and I unite myself to you wholly.

Never permit me to be separated from you because I am your child.

Comfort me with the knowledge that you are with me and within me and I belong to you.

NOVEL CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19)

In light of the ongoing developments in relation to COVID-19 we wanted to provide all parishioners with an update as we all have a part to play in the prevention of the spread of this disease. We also have a duty of care to the health and wellbeing of all, and to ensure we are being vigilant in managing this outbreak. COVID-19 is a respiratory illness with symptoms ranging from a mild cough to pneumonia. Some people recover easily, others may get very sick very quickly. There is evidence that it spreads from person to person. The safety and welfare of our Parish community is really important and we endeavour to promote and provide a safe environment for Health https://www.health.gov.au/ all.

Our Church is locked and alarmed, so until further advised we cannot enter. We have a table outside the door which will contain copies of this and future bulletins and other important information. All Masses remain cancelled until further notice. Below is some further information during this time:

- No Reconciliation will be held, but suitable arrangements can be made with Fr Krish who would meet with you (outside the church). If you wish please contact Fr Krish on 9412 8471.
- No Baptisms will be held until further notice except in danger of death.
- Funerals are restricted to 10 mourners only.
- Weddings are restricted to five people (Minister, Couple and Witnesses).
- No Parish gatherings (i.e. prayer groups and meetings).

It is also recommended:

- To continue the practice of good hygiene to prevent the spread of colds and infection. Transmission of infections can be reduced by 80% simply by regular washing of hands;
- Keep all surfaces clean;
- Frequently clean hands by using an alcohol-based hand sanitiser or soap and

water;

- When coughing and sneezing cover mouth and nose with flexed elbow or tissue – throw tissue away immediately in a sealed bin and wash hands;
- Avoid close contact with anyone who has fever and cough;
- If you have fever, cough and difficulty breathing, seek medical care early and share previous travel history with your health care provider.
