Dear friends, our theme for the second week of Advent is 'prepare a way for the Lord'! We are to straighten our wayward paths and smooth out our rough ways in readiness for Christ's coming. This is easier said than done. Paul's letter in the Second Reading (Phil 1:4-6, 8-11) is reassuring as he reminds us "the One who began this good work in you will see that it is finished when the Day of Christ Jesus comes." God will help us cross the line!

Paul then prays the Philippians will increase in love, knowledge, perception and discernment. During the season of Advent, we are called to be intentional to be our better self, to grow in our relationship with God and to help create a just society. Perhaps increasing one's service, reading a new book, learning a new skill or devoting time to spiritual discernment are ways we can live out some of these principles and allow God to work in us through them.

In the Gospel (Luke 3:1-6), we hear about John the Baptist and his preaching ministry which prepared people for the coming Messiah. John's preparation is not simply proclaiming the arrival, but helping people to live righteously, emphasising repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The beginning of the new liturgical year is an opportune time to reflect, acknowledge our struggles and count our blessings. We are privileged to have a few

from the parish community doing just that at Masses this and next weekend to inspire us to be more.

POLISH NEWS

Św. Andrzej - pierwszy powołany apostoł

Wkraczając na drogę adwentu spotykamy pierwszą - wielką postać tego nowego okresu liturgicznego, św. Andrzeja. Najczęściej to imię kojarzy nam się z zabawami andrzejkowymi w czasie tzw. "ostatków". Jednak musimy by świadomi, że za tą postacią kryje się o wiele więcej niż zabawy andrzejkowe.

Św. Andrzej pochodził z Betsaidy nad Jeziorem Galilejskim. Wiemy, że był rybakiem i początkowo uczniem św. Jana Chrzciciela. Później stał się uczniem Jezusa. To właśnie on przyprowadził swojego brata, Szymona Piotra, do Jezusa. Wezwanie do pójścia za Jezusem relacjonuje św. Mateusz. Jezus przechodził wówczas obok Jeziora Galilejskiego. Ujrzał wtedy Andrzeja i Szymona Piotra, jak zarzucali sieci do wody. Wezwał ich do siebie, oni pozostawili swoje zajęcie i poszli za Nim. Andrzej mieszkał z Piotrem w Kafarnaum, gdzie kilkakrotnie zatrzymywała się Jezus. Tam nastąpiło uzdrowienie teściowej Piotra. Andrzej był także świadkiem cudu w Kanie Galilejskiej, gdzie Jezus objawił swoją chwałę nowożeńcom i gościom, oraz świadkiem cudownego rozmnożenia chleba – apostoł zwrócił się do Mistrza słowami: "Jest tu jeden chłopiec, który ma pięć chlebów jęczmiennych i dwie ryby, ale cóż to jest dla tak wielu?" (J 6,9). Wspominają o nim także Dzieje Apostolskie.

Pisma Ojców Kościoła również przekazują nam informacje na temat Andrzeja. Pracował w Scytii (Orygenes), Poncie, Kapadocji, Bitynii i Achai (Hieronim). Życie zakończył śmiercią męczeńską w Patras, w Achai. Według tekstów apokryficznych tuż po zesłaniu Ducha Świętego Andrzej głosił Dobrą Nowinę i dokonywał cudów. Był człowiekiem oddanym swojej misji, a neofici byli zachwyceni jego nauką. Został skazany przez Aegeasa, gdyż przemawiał do tłumów i zwracał uwagę na nieprawości i grzechy. Jego Ms Fran Baccarin śmierci na krzyżu przyglądało się podobno 12 tys. osób. Gdy konał, pojawiła się nad nim zadziwiająca jasność.

Zmarł 30 listopada 65 lub 70 roku. Tradycja wschodnia wskazuje na rok 62. Prawosławni uważają, że umierał 3 dni. Według nich nie został przybity do krzyża, ale został do niego przywiązany. Zgodnie z podaniami Andrzej poniósł śmierć męczeńską. Został rozpięty na krzyżu w kształcie litery X (pierwsza litera od słowa Chrystus, z języka greckiego: Christos (Χριστος), co jak wiemy oznacza namaszczonego, pomazańca).

W Polsce kształt krzyża, na którym umarł apostoł nazywa się "krzyżem św. Andrzeja". Umieszczany jest przed przejazdami kolejowymi dlatego, że ten święty jest uznawany za patrona podróżnych. Warto dodać, że tradycja dotycząca formy jego śmierci rozpowszechniła się od X wieku.

W 356 roku jego relikwie przywieziono do Konstantynopola i umieszczono w kościele Apostołów. Obecnie znajdują się w Patras, podobnie zresztą jak relikwie krzyża, na którym skonał św. Andrzej. Św. Andrzej jest patronem wielu państw i miast, m.in. Szkocji, Hiszpanii, Grecji, Neapolu.

Po jego śmierci wiele osób nawróciło się. Byli poruszeni świadectwem jego życia i wiary. Nazywany "Apostołem Słowian" i "Apostołem Wschodu". Wyznawcy religii prawosławnej uznają Andrzeja za założyciela Kijowa. Jego atrybutami są: krzyż, sieć, księga i ryba.
