
Dear friends, we have begun the Season of Creation, a new Liturgical Season for the Catholic community globally as it joins the 30-year ecumenical/orthodox history of celebration. It extends from 1st September, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, to 4th October, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi. The Season focuses on God as Creator of the vast cosmic universe, God's revelation in Creation, and our calling to care for God's creation, protect its rich diversity and address the urgent, destructive crises threatening its health and future. These themes are elaborated in the Pope's letter to all humanity on the environment *Laudato Si'* ('Praise be to you') written in 2015. The

Covid pandemic has disrupted life, triggered change to a new reality and if we are honest, revealed our current human activities and consumption to be unsustainable. The Way Forward challenges us to rethink our priorities and renew our relationships with our Creator and the created world through the lens of *Laudato Si'*. We hope this Season of Creation offers each of you that opportunity for reflection and action.

Our readings this weekend can guide us. In the First Reading (Ezek 33:7-9), the prophet Ezekiel describes God's warning to himself and to us: if we hear and fail to relay God's call to conversion to those it is intended for, we will be held responsible and complicit in their sin and punishment. A central belief at the heart of *Laudato Si'* is that everything and everyone is inter-connected, inter-dependent. We are responsible for each other. During the Season of Creation, we are invited to listen to "the cry of the Earth and the cry of the poor." (LS #49). In the Second Reading (Rom 13:8-10), Paul reminds us love of neighbour is the fulfilment of the Law. We cannot say we love God if we do not love our neighbour. We cannot say we love our neighbour if we do not care for the air, water, land, and ecological systems upon which our neighbours and we depend for life. In the Gospel (Matt 18:15-20), Jesus lays out a way in community to convey the urgent prophetic warnings in this time of ecological crisis, an approach that shows respect for those who need to hear these truths and invites conversion gently but persistently. At the same time, the approach is realistic:

there will be those who will not listen, and caring for our common home is too important to be bogged down in endless arguments with those who, in the words of the psalm, have hardened their hearts.

This year's theme for the Season of Creation is Jubilee for the Earth. Pope Francis reminds us in the Scriptures, a Jubilee is a sacred time to remember, return, rest, restore, and rejoice.



To remember "we exist only in relationships: with God the Creator, with our brothers and sisters as members of a common family, and with all of God's creatures within our common home." To return to God and be "at peace with the Creator who is the source and origin of all things." To rest "from our usual labour and to let the land heal and the earth repair itself." To **restore** "the original harmony of creation and to heal strained human relationships." To rejoice at how Laudato Si' "is inspiring many initiatives at local and global levels for the care of our common home and the poor."

I am thankful for the Laudato Si' team made up of parishioners and teachers from the school who have come together to brainstorm and discern ways to promote and live out its message in our community. May their insights and stories at Mass inspire you in this Season of Creation. This weekend we also acknowledge the gift of fathers and all significant men in the lives of children, young and old, past and present. Happy Father's Day!

ASSISTED SUICIDE BILL TO BE INTRODUCED INTO PARLIAMENT THIS WEEK

Mersey MLC Mike Gaffney will introduce a Bill that will legalise assisted suicide into the Tasmanian Legislative Council on Thursday, August 27. This Bill will make Tasmania's laws some of the most permissive in the world. The Bill does not require the person to have a terminal illness and has watered down a number of safeguards that are meant to protect vulnerable people. Please contact your local State MPs to express your concern. A letter writing kit is available at the back of the Church. Whilst handwritten letters are received better, this weekend we have prepared standard letters addressed to each of our local members of both houses of Parliament, to which you will be able to add your name, address and signature and we will post these on your behalf.

POLISH NEWS

Dar wolności

Już od zarania istnienia ludzkości pojawia się zagadnienie wolości. Pan Bóg stwarzjąc człowieka w raju obdarował do właśnie tym darem. Powołując człowieka do istnienia wyposarzył go w dar wolej woli, czyli wolności wybierania tego co uważa za słuszne. W imię dobradla siebie lub innych. Myślę jednak, że człowiek potrzebuje wielu doświadczeń życiowych, by dojrzeć do umiejętności korzystania z tego niezwykłego daru.

Na zagadnienie wolności można patrzeć z różnych perspektyw i różnie je pojmować. Jedni mówiąc o wolności mają na myśli wolność słowa pisanego czy też mówionego. Inni mówią o wolności podejmowania decyzji i wyboru sposobu życia takiego jaki uważają za dobry dla siebie. Źle pojmowana wolność często niestety prowadzi do narkomani, alkoholizmu, krzywdy drugiej osoby czy też stałego oportunizmu.

Pierwszego września obchodziliśmy 81 rocznicę wybuchu II Wojny Światowej. Atak na Westerplatte był jednocześnie atakiem na dwadzieścia lat wcześniej odzyskaną wolność narodową. Okupacja nimiecka ponownie odebrała narodowi polskiemu wolność słowa, kultury, posługiwania się ojczystym językiem, wyznawania religi ale też wolość osobistą. Tysiące młodych ludzi w odpowiedzi na ten atak wyruszyło na wojnę i poświęciło swoje życie, by odzyskać niepodległość dla kraju i wolność osobistą. W wojennej historii, Polskich żołnierzy można odnaleźć na wszystkich frontach, bo wszędzie tam gdzie walczyli mieli ma uwadze dobro i wolność Polski. Dar wolności i swobody bycia Polakiem był wtedy wartością nadrzędną, a wszyscy ci, którzy oddali swoje życie w walce o niepodległość kraju zapominali o sobie i poświęcili swoje życie w imię Boga, Honoru

Wojenna zawierucha spowodowała

ogromne ruchy migracyjne, niektórzy do ojczystego kraju już nigdy nie powrócili. Jednak wszędzie tam gdzie się osiedlili tworzyli swoją mała Polskę ponieważ otrzymani bezcenny dar wolności.

Mając w pamięci ofiarę życia tysięcy Polskich żołnierzy zadajmy sobie pytanie jak korzystam z tego daru wolności? Jakim jestem Polakiem? Jakim jestem patriotą? Czy oddaję cześć tym, co polegli bym ja – Polak mógł żyć i cieszyć się wolnością? Niech te pytania stale do nas powracają byśmy wydobywali z pokładównaszych serc najcenniejsze warości i godnie reprezentowali naszą Ojczyznę.

Cześć pamięci tych, co położyli swoje życie na szali naszej wolności!


NOVEMBER MASS OFFERINGS
