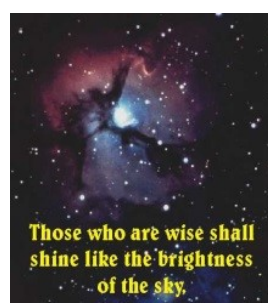

World Day of the Poor
Sunday 14 November 2021

Theme: 'The poor you will always
have with you' (Mk 14:7)



Dear friends, in the blink of an eye, we are fast approaching the end of the liturgical year! On this final Sunday in Ordinary Time, we are confronted with dark images that point us to the end times, to a final judgment. The context is Jesus is nearing the end of His ministry and is stressing His forthcoming suffering, death and resurrection to His followers. The image of the Son of Man coming in the clouds with power and glory draws on the vision of the prophet Daniel (ch 7). This person has power and everlasting dominion, and Mark's Gospel frequently identifies Jesus as the Son of Man to affirm His authority and kingship.

The second part of the Gospel refers to an earlier event in which Jesus cursed a fig tree because it failed to produce fruit. Here, the growth of a fig tree indicates summer is near. Both realities remind the disciples that they must be fruitful in ministry, continuing to grow the community even after Jesus' death. The emphasis on seasons reminds us to be ready for the new season ahead. Advent leading to Christmas and a post-Covid New Year will bring new challenges and joys. Will the words of Jesus that will never pass away be our rock?

Today (14th November 2021) is the fifth World Day of the Poor, initiated by Pope Francis in 2017. The theme for this year is "*for the poor you have always with you*" from the words of Jesus at the Anointing in Bethany just before His Passion. Pope Francis tell us that the poor, always and everywhere, evangelise us, because they enable us to discover in new ways the face of God: "*They have much to teach us.....they know the suffering Christ through their own sufferings...We are called to discover Christ in them, to lend them our voice in their causes, but also to be their friends, to listen to them, to understand them and to welcome the mysterious wisdom that God wants to communicate to us through them...what the Holy Spirit mobilises is not an unruly activism, but above all an attentiveness that considers the other in*

a certain sense as one with ourselves.” (*Evangelii Gaudium*, 198-199). Below are some excerpts from Caritas Social Action Network (CSAN)’s online resources for the World Day of the Poor. The reading this weekend is Pope Francis’ message dedicated for this day. May you be challenged as I am in our reaching out to the poor to be evangelised by them!



What is poverty? Poverty is an experience – of a person, a group or a whole country - of lacking one or more conditions necessary for an adequate standard of living. The most extreme form is destitution: when you have no foreseeable opportunity to access, for example, enough food to survive or basic health care, no accommodation, or are forced into degrading activities. Poverty may be a misery affecting the whole person, sometimes hidden in the experience of prolonged isolation, or subjection to wrongful discrimination. Systemic poverty arises where social and economic structures leave some citizens cut off from what should be available to everyone.

What does the Church say about our relationship with material goods? God delights in every person: each is created good, with a deepest desire to live life to the full. Material goods and wealth are neither good nor bad on their own.

Catholic teaching upholds the right to seek profit from work and to acquire private property, while recognising the ‘universal destination of goods’. In other words, personal wealth is first to meet our own needs and those of family for adequate living; any extra should be considered available to our neighbours’ and community’s needs. This means we have to listen and seek to understand what is going on around us. Who is cut off or prevented from enjoying an adequate standard of living? How might my use of talents and material goods contribute in this state of affairs? Would a simpler way of living create more freedom to live well?

Why do Christians choose a ‘preferential love’ for the poor? For the Christian, neighbour love is more than a reasoned calculation about adequacy and ‘need’. St Paul explains (Gal. 3:28) that in Christ – that is, in choosing the way of love in its fulness - there is neither young nor old, slave nor free. All share a common call to life in one human family and a finite resource, a span of days on earth. Faith, hope, and above all love, Paul says, urge us (2 Cor. 5:14) to go beyond a minimum, legal obligation to our neighbour. Christ exemplifies this in His way of challenging poverty – in deep humility and reverence, to be with people who are most excluded from life by the oppression, laws and customs of His time – whether they are poor (for example, because of disability), rich (tax collectors) or turned too far in on themselves (the over-scrupulously religious). In the Catholic tradition, this is called the ‘preferential option’ for the poor. It is the way of Christ, a vital way of seeing and coming to know Him, a path of true freedom and lasting joy: on this path we will never be alone.

POLISH NEWS

Orędzie Prezydenta Rzeczypospolitej Polskiej!

W czwartek obchodziliśmy 103 rocznicę Odzyskania Niepodległości przez naszą ojczyznę dlatego dziś w ramach artykułu pragnę podać fragmenty orędzia Prezydenta RP skierowane do Polaków właśnie z tej okazji.

Drodzy Rodacy! Szanowni Państwo!

W dniu Narodowego Święta Niepodległości, myślimy o tych, którzy tak wiele zrobili, by Rzeczpospolita wróciła na mapę Europy. Wspominamy bohaterów – często nieznanymi imionami i nazwiskami – którzy heroicznym czynem zbrojnym, dzielnością żołnierską i własną krwią wywalczyli i obronili wolną Polskę. To ta wspomniana w pieśni „szara piechota” wywalczyła wolność i ocaliła naszą Ojczyznę sto lat temu. Nasi rodacy, przodkowie i poprzednicy sprzed stulecia pozostawili zawsze aktualny wzór, który naśladujemy dziś my – ich współcześni następcy w historycznej sztafecie pokoleń. Dzisiaj lepiej niż kiedykolwiek widzimy odwagę, męstwo i patriotyzm wszystkich pełniących służbę na naszej granicy. W ostatnich dniach nasz kraj stał się celem ataku hybrydowego, sterowanego przez KGB Aleksandra Łukaszenki. Migranci z Bliskiego Wschodu są brutalnie wykorzystywani przez dyktaturę, aby zdestabilizować sytuację w Polsce i w Unii Europejskiej. Jest to wynik konsekwentnej i zaplanowanej polityki reżimu Łukaszenki, który nie cofnął się przed sfałszowaniem wyborów

prezydenckich, przed represjami, strzelaniem do swoich rodaków i uwięzieniem tysięcy przedstawicieli opozycji, przed jawnym łamaniem praw człowieka. Nasza Straż Graniczna, żołnierze i policjanci bronią dziś terytorium Rzeczypospolitej – wschodniej granicy Unii Europejskiej i NATO. Jestem im wdzięczny za profesjonalizm i determinację. Dlatego dzisiaj, w tym symbolicznym dniu, byłem na granicy z Białorusią, by osobiście w imieniu swoim i milionów Polaków podziękować im za poświęcenie i ofiarną służbę. W tym wyjątkowym dniu, gdy wspominamy bohaterów Niepodległej, pamiętajmy też o funkcjonariuszach Straży Granicznej, żołnierzach, policjantach i przedstawicielach innych służb, którzy bronią naszych granic. Ich mundur, który jest znakiem służby państwowej, zasługuje na szacunek wszystkich rodaków. (...) Wielokrotnie deklarowaliśmy gotowość pomocy humanitarnej migrantom, którzy znaleźli się na terytorium Białorusi. Reżim Łukaszenki za każdym razem odrzucał nasze propozycje. Konwój, który na moją osobistą prośbę rząd skierował na granicę, nie został wpuszczony na Białoruś. Zapewniam, że Polska jest przygotowana do odparcia tej akcji służb reżimu Łukaszenki. Nasza Straż Graniczna, Wojsko Polskie, Policja i inne służby są w stanie najwyższej gotowości. Nie możemy zgodzić się na nielegalne przekraczanie polskiej granicy. Zgoda na nielegalne wejście nawet niewielkiej liczby migrantów lub brak adekwatnej reakcji spowodowałyby dramatyczne konsekwencje zarówno dla nas, jak i dla całej Unii Europejskiej. Dziesiątki, a może nawet setki tysięcy ludzi oszukanych przez Łukaszenkę szturmowałyby polską granicę. Oznaczałoby to jeszcze więcej ludzkich nieszczęść i tragedii. (...) Szacunek dla munduru to szacunek dla suwerennej Ojczyzny. To szacunek dla Rzeczypospolitej, która łączy nas wszystkich w jedną wspólnotę. Bo Polska jest naszym wspólnym domem. Dbajmy o niego i pamiętajmy o tych, którzy go bronią i strzegą, którzy na co dzień służą naszemu państwu i każdemu z nas. Wspierajmy ich i bądźmy z nimi solidarni. W imię Niepodległej.

Zwracam się do Państwa w dniu szczególnym, w Narodowe Święto Niepodległości. Pamiętajmy każdego dnia o szacunku dla polskiego munduru. Niech żyje Polska!
