Dear friends, this weekend we celebrate The Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the feast day of the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart (MSCs). The Sacred Heart of Jesus started off as a devotional with a long history within Christianity. In fact, the beginnings of a devotion of the love of God symbolised by the heart of Jesus were found in the writings of the fathers of the Church, like Origen, St. Ambrose, St. Jerome and St. Augustine of Hippo. It was only in recent times that it has been established as a Solemnity for the universal Church. The Solemnity was first celebrated in France. The liturgy was approved by the local bishop at the behest of St. John Eudes, who celebrated the Mass on August 31, 1670. The celebration was quickly adopted in other places in France. In 1856, two years after the establishment of the MSCs, Pope Pius IX established the Feast of the Sacred Heart as obligatory for the whole Church, celebrated 19 days after Pentecost on a Friday.

Pope Benedict XVI wrote in 2006: "By encouraging devotion to the Heart of Jesus, [we exhort] believers to open themselves to the mystery of God and of His love and to allow themselves to be transformed by it." From this source - the Heart of Jesus, originates the true knowledge of Jesus Christ and a deeper experience of His love. A devotion to the Sacred Heart will help us understand better what it means to know God's love in Jesus Christ, to experience Him, keeping our gaze fixed on Him to the point that we live entirely on the experience of His love, so that we can subsequently witness to it to others. Hence the MSC motto: 'May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be everywhere loved!'

Going deeper, a life in union with the Heart of Christ cannot remain just a devotion to do; it is the very core of our spirituality. The 19th century was a great time for devotions to the Immaculate Heart of Mary, to the Eucharist, to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. When we think of


a devotion, we may think of set practices like kneeling down in front of a statue, burning a candle, saying a prayer etc. and one can have several devotions. But a spirituality is something deeper: it springs from within, from a central vision which determines who we are and how we live. Spirituality of the Heart reverences the human heart as loved by God unconditionally, and as the privileged place of encounter with God. Living such a spirituality involves making the journey into one's own heart and into the heart of the human condition, open to encountering there the compassionate heart of Jesus.

It is this encounter that has the potential to transform our hearts so we can live differently. Since the time of his studies in the seminary, our founder Jules Chevalier was concerned about the evils of his time, and he was convinced the Heart of Christ was the remedy for those evils, which included rationalism, religious indifference and anticlericalism widespread in 19th century France. What struck Fr. Chevalier about the Heart of Christ was the fire of His love, a compassionate love for all who suffer. He saw the Heart of Christ as the incarnation and revelation of the compassionate love of the Father, which inspired him and many others to bear witness to that love which can heal the wounded hearts of many. He wrote beautifully in 1862 of this expansive vision:

As Missionaries of the Sacred Heart, we are about being sent – but not to a particular place or to a particular type of work; rather, we are sent to live out the sentiments and love of the Heart of Christ - everywhere. To be like Jesus who loved with a human heart in response to the pain and suffering of the world. We believe, as did Chevalier that this love is the remedy for the ills of the world in our time. What a great feast to celebrate our homecoming as we welcome all of you back to the parish this weekend! We are reminded to be patient and gentle with each other with all the necessary measures of booking for Mass, signing in/out, health checks and social distancing. Let us begin a new chapter journeying together as a community, the Way forward, into the Heart of Jesus!


PARISHIONERS' CORNER

POLISH NEWS

KULT NAJŚWIĘTSZEGO SERCA PANA JEZUSA

W ostatni piątek przeżywaliśmy uroczystość Najświętszego Serca Pana Jezusa. Jesteśmy wezwani, byśmy wynagradzali Sercu Pana Jezusa grzechy, niewdzięczność i oziębłość religijną ludzi.

Kult Serca Jezusowego wywodzi się z czasów średniowiecza. Główna zasługa w rozpowszechnieniu nabożeństwa do Najświętszego Serca Pana Jezusa przypada skromnej zakonnicy, wizytce, św. Małgorzacie Marii Alacoque.

27 grudnia 1673 roku Pan Jezus pokazując jej swoje Serce pełne ognia, rzekł do niej: Moje Boskie Serce tak płonie miłością ku ludziom, że nie może dłużej utrzymać tych płomieni gorejących, zamkniętych w moim łonie. Ono pragnie rozlać je za twoim pośrednictwem i pragnie wzbogacić ludzi

swoimi Bożymi skarbami. Następnie Jezus wziął serce Małgorzaty i umieścił je symbolicznie w swoim Sercu. Potem już przemienione i jaśniejące oddał Małgorzacie.

Drugie objawienie miało miejsce na początku roku 1674. Pan Jezus ponownie objawił Małgorzacie swoje Serce i wymienił dobrodziejstwa i łaski, jakie przyrzeka czcicielom swojego Serca. To nabożeństwo jest ostatnim wysiłkiem Jego miłości i będzie dla ludzi jedynym ratunkiem w ostatnich czasach. Wśród różnych form czci Pan Jezus zaządał czci także wizerunków swojego Serca.

W tym samym roku 1674 miało miejsce trzecie z wielkich objawień. W czasie wystawienia Najświętszego Sakramentu Pan Jezus pojawił się jaśniejący chwałą, ze stygmatami pięciu ran, jaśniejącymi jak słońce. Pan Jezus zażądał, aby w zamian za Fran Bearman niewdzięczność, jaka spotyka Jego Serce i Principal Jego miłość, okazaną rodzajowi ludzkiemu, dusze pobożne wynagradzały Jego Sercu, zranionemu grzechami i niewdzięcznością ludzką. Zażądał, aby w duchu wynagrodzenia w każdą noc przed pierwszym piątkiem miesiąca – odbywała się godzinna adoracja Najświętszego Sakramentu (tzw. Godzina święta) oraz, aby Komunia święta, w pierwsze piątki miesiąca, była ofiarowana w celu wynagrodzenia Boskiemu Sercu za grzechy i oziębłość ludzką.

> Wreszcie w piątek, po oktawie Bożego Ciała, 10 czerwca 1675 roku, nastąpiło ostatnie wielkie objawienie. Kiedy Małgorzata klęczała przed tabernakulum w czasie nawiedzenia Najświętszego Sakramentu, ukazał się jej Chrystus, odsłonił swoje Serce i powiedział: *Oto Serce, które tak bardzo* umiłowało ludzi, że nie szczędziło niczego aż do zupełnego wyniszczenia się dla okazania im miłości, a w zamian za to doznaje od większości ludzi tylko gorzkiej

niewdzięczności, wzgardy, nieuszanowania, lekceważenia, oziębłości i świętokradztw, jakie oddają mu w tym Sakramencie Miłości. Lecz najbardziej boli Mnie to, że w podobny sposób obchodzą się ze Mną serca służbie mojej szczególnie poświęcone. Dlatego żądam, aby pierwszy piątek po oktawie Bożego Ciała był odtąd poświęcony jako osobne święto ku czci mojego Serca i na wynagrodzenie Mi przez Komunię i inne praktyki pobożne zniewag, jakich doznaję. W zamian za to obiecuję ci, że Serce moje wyleje hojne łaski na tych wszystkich, którzy w ten sposób oddadzą Mu cześć lub przyczynią się do jej rozszerzenia.

Kościół widzi w nabożeństwie do Serca Jezusowego znak miłości Boga ku ludziom. Chce także rozbudzić w sercach ludzkich wzajemną miłość ku Bogu poprzez to nabożeństwo. Sam Chrystus nadał temu nabożeństwu charakter przebłagalny: ma nas ono uwrażliwiać na grzech, mobilizować w imię miłości Chrystusa do walki z nim

oraz do wynagradzania za tych, którzy najwięcej ranią Boże Serce.

The Story

In todays' gospel from Matthew, Jesus continues to prepare his disciples to go and spread the Good News to those who have not heard it. Jesus tells them, "Do not be afraid of anyone!" This phrase (or similar words) occurs 366 times in the Bible. Clearly, it is a message Jesus wants us to hear and observe.

Family Discussion

As a family, talk about something you know about each other that maybe no one else knows. Jesus tells us that God knows and loves us even more than anyone in our family. How does that make you feel? Chat about who you talk to if you are worried about doing something new. Remember that we can talk to God (pray) if we feel frightened or alone.

Family Activity

You will need pieces of paper for each person, pens, and a basket. Gather the family together - it could be around the table, in a circle on the floor or at a park. Each person writes or draws ways that they need God's help for themselves, or for the family, or for someone else. Collect the pieces of paper in the basket. Remembering that God knows and loves us, someone takes a slip of paper from the basket, reads it to the family, and then all pray together for that need, "Loving God who knows and loves us, hear our prayer."

You may choose to continue this as a meal or bedtime routine.


