FROM THE PASTOR

OUR LACK OF WELCOME

"Widows, orphans, and strangers", that's code in scripture for the three most vulnerable groups within a society at any given time. And both the great Jewish prophets and Jesus, himself, assure us that ultimately, we will be judged by how we treated these while we were alive.

It's interesting to look at any given book in the bible and ask this question: "What did the author of this book consider as the very essence of religion? You'll get different answers. For example, if you had asked that question to the authors of *Exodus, Deuteronomy*, or *Numbers*, they would have answered that what was central to their faith was proper religious practice, keeping the Commandments and being faithful to the other prescribed codes of religious practice of their time.

However, when the great prophets (Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel, and Joel) came along they painted a different picture. For them, true religiosity was not identified simply with fidelity to religious practice; it was judged rather on how one treated the poor. For them, the quality of your faith is to be judged by the quality of justice in the land; and the quality of justice in the land is always to be judged by how "widows, orphans, and strangers" fare while you are alive. For the prophets, the practice of justice took priority over proper religious belonging and fidelity to religious practice.

We see numerous sayings by the prophets that warn us that what God wants from us is not sacrifice on altars but fair wages for the poor, not the recitation of prescribed prayers but justice for widows, and not the honouring of religious festivals but the giving of hospitality to strangers.

It should be noted, of course, that, after the prophets, we have the great wisdom figures in Jewish history. For them, the essence of religion was neither faithful religious practice nor simple outreach to the poor, but having a wise and compassionate heart, out of which you would then be faithful to both proper religious practice and outreach to the poor.

This is the tradition that Jesus inherits. What does he do with it? He ratifies all three. For Jesus, true religiosity asks for all of these: faithful religious practice, outreach to the poor, and a wise and compassionate heart. For Jesus, you don't pick between these, you do them all. He tells us clearly: "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" (John 14); but he also tells us that we will ultimately be judged on the basis of how we treat the poor (Matthew 25); even as he tells us that what God really wants from us is a wise, compassionate heart. (Luke 6 & 15)

FROM THE PASTOR

For Jesus, we are true disciples when we have compassionate hearts out of which we keep the commandments, humbly worship our God, but make it a religious priority to reach out to the most vulnerable groups in our society. Indeed, on this latter point, Jesus' warnings are much stronger even than those of the great Jewish prophets. The prophets affirmed that God favours the poor; Jesus affirmed that God is in the poor ("whatsoever you do to the least, you do to me"). How we treat the poor is how we are treating God.

Moreover (and I doubt we've ever taken this seriously) Jesus tells us that, at the final judgment, we will be judged for heaven or hell on the basis of how we treated the poor, particularly on how we treated the most vulnerable among them ("widows, orphans, and strangers"). In Matthew 25, he lays out the criteria upon which we will be judged, for heaven or for hell. Notice that in these particular criteria there aren't any questions about whether we kept the commandments, about whether we went to church or not, or even whether our sexual lives were in order. Here we're to be judged solely on how we treated the poor. It can be rather frightening and confusing to take this at face value, namely, that we will go to heaven or hell solely on the basis of how we treated the poor.

I highlight this because today so many of us, sincere, church-going, Christians do not seem to have either an eye or a heart for the "widows, orphans, and strangers" around us. Who are the most vulnerable groups on our world today? Who today, as Gustavo Gutierrez defines the poor, does not have a right to have rights?

Let me risk stating the obvious: Among the "widows, orphans, and strangers" in our world today are the unborn, the refugees, and the immigrants. Happily, most sincere Christians are not blind to the plight of the unborn. Less happily, too many of us are religiously blind to the plight of millions of refugees looking for someone to welcome them. Every newscast we watch tells us that we're not much welcoming the stranger.

How soon we forget God's warning: "You are to love those who are foreigners, for you yourselves were once foreigners." (Deuteronomy 10, 18-19)


MOVEMBER DONATIONS TO SUPPORT FR MARK'S

PLENARY COUNCIL DRAFT RESPONSE

The Parish gathered together on Saturday 13th October in the School/Parish Hall to reflect upon our response to the call of the Plenary Council. The following are the verbatim submissions that were captured during this session together with submissions from some additional people who could not attend. We are seeking your feedback on these submissions, including any comments before a further draft is developed. This draft will then be provided to the Parish for further comment before it is submitted directly to the Plenary Council and the Missionaries of the Sacred Heart. If you have any comments on what has been expressed or wish to add your own submissions, these could be provided either directly to the Parish Office in person or via email to moonahlutana@aohtas.org.au. Provided in this bulletin are additional lines for you to do so, if you so desire. Any submissions are to be provided by Friday, 7th December. Thank you.

FAITH EDUCATION

- Faith growth and support are areas for all to work on especially RCIA, RCIC and Adult Faith Education.
- The Church needs to bring some of its teachings that are not from Jesus' teachings an example to be optional, still devotional but not constrainings to faith, the church or its members.
- Be helped to unpack the scriptures Update Scripture knowledge.
- More education on Theology of the Mass
 Child friendly.

CHURCH STRUCTURE

- Protecting clericalism will not work.
- Catholics don't know how to become a post Vatican II Church. We are reverting to a pre Vatican Church - dogma, clericalism, theology, demanding certainty. The pre Vatican Church is not going to work in a global church.
- Transparency of church processes.
- I think the church needs to use Jesus as the model more fully in its treatment of its members. Less rules and regulations and more compassion. Inclusiveness is very important.
- A reformation of where the church is.
- Recognise the conservative element in the Church bringing them with us.
- · Church Patriarchy.

CLERGY

- Priests need to be more transparent in their duties and life skills.
- Priests should be able to marry.
- I do not believe that married priests will stop child molestation but that good discernment, character checks and good processes are the answer.
- Married priests should be examined as there are many men of deep faith who can serve us but also seek marriage. If the other rites of the Catholic church can have married priests so can we.
- Address re-engagement of priests who have left.
- Suspect the training priests.
- Effect of Royal Commission.
- Quality sermons play a large part in attracting and keeping parishioners and we need to support this for our seminarians.

SACRAMENTS

- Sacraments.
- Bring back the 3rd rite.
- Enable lay people to give sacrament of the sick.

MARGINALISED

- Jesus was a marginal Jew. The Church is 'God's hands on earth' responding to the needs of people.
- We are not an institution, an organisation, an employer or a land owner. Jesus listened to the suffering of people and walked with them. That is not the model we are seeing of the Catholic Church.
 - "Love in action" and how a parish looks at love and what can be improved throughout the current church of Australia. Our parish is a great one that follows the MSC charism which fits well with love in action. We talked about how as a parish and as a church in general we are called to be inclusive and loving people towards all. And that as a catholic people we should put a focus in support and care for all, poor, lonely, old, sick, isolated and disabled. And how we should live the faith through opportunities of social justice and have a personal responsibility to this. To not say someone else is looking after the less fortunate but to go out and help yourself.
- We are a community and we need to break down barriers; we need to step outside our comfort zone.

 We need to keep loving, being caring & sensitive to each other's needs.

 We need to be mindful and caring of the environment.

We need to be visible in any follow-up to actions – faith in action eg: homelessness, unemployed, refugee families.

We need to break down the loneliness barrier that parishioners & the community experience.

We need to ensure that Jesus does not become a stranger to us & that we do not become strangers to each other.

• Why are we giving health care to the rich and middle class. Unless it serves the

- poor get rid of it.
- Same with rich schools Just because we needed to do it in the past does not mean we should be doing it now.
- The Church needs to speak out clearly, loudly and with conviction on human rights abuse and environmental destruction.
- Jesus' face in each other.
- · Reach out in all directions.
- To recognise the need of all in Tasmania and the nation.
- Support current structure that supports the poor.
- Acceptance of humanity love of humanity – not just words – repetitive.
- More involvement with the poor.
- Divorce must be looked at the right of wronged people to have acceptance at the altar.
- See the face of Christ in the churched and unchurched.
- Caring for everyone.
- Not just words, follow up with a deed.
- Acceptance of people from all walks of life.
- Tolerance.
- People hungry in the Church.

LAITY & WOMEN

- The Church needs to welcome women into the role of Deacon within our Catholic Church.
- I think that there needs to be acknowledgement of the role and faith of the laity and women in particular. The royal commission raised issues that go to the patriarchal nature of the church which needs to be addressed.
- Women in the church.

YOUNG PEOPLE




- leadership roles and a possible mentorship in ministry between youth and parish members.


