FROM THE PASTOR

THE PELL VERDICT

As this verdict against Cardinal George Pell has now emerged, many people among us will be feeling deeply painful emotions. Our hearts are with all those who are survivors of sexual abuse and we continue to pray for them and their families, and also for those who have not survived. Many people are outraged at the apparent betrayal of trust at the highest church office in the country by one who ascended to even higher office in the Vatican. This comes in the wake of the dismissal from the clerical state (defrocking) of Cardinal McCarrick of Washington DC for his crimes of sexual abuse of children and soliciting of adults. No doubt these revelations will cause deep confusion and shake the ground on which many people of faith stand, and some may wonder why they would be part of such a church. The entire tragic revelation of betrayal of trust in the church by members who were supposed to be the epitome of trustworthiness has left many people wondering where they stand with their faith. I would like to cautiously and humbly reaffirm this... that our faith is in Jesus Christ. In spite of the failings of members of the institution, Jesus is the living Christ, crucified and risen, who speaks to each of us today. He himself had an uncertain group of immediate followers, one of whom betrayed him, one of whom denied he knew him, and others who lost courage. He calls us to integrity, and he calls us to keep faith in him even when these representatives betray him and us. We are the church! We are the people of God despite some Judas Iscariots among us. Wherever human beings are, there will be sin. Yet there will also be saints, too. These events and this time is a purging. That purification gives me hope for the future.

Many of us may need an opportunity to air our feelings about all this and pray together. We will have a forum for this on this coming Thursday evening, 7th March at 7.00 pm in the Community Room at the back of the church. If numbers demand it we will move over to the Hall.

FROM THE PASTOR

ECCLESIAL POWER

The Australian Royal Commission Into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse has helped to shine a light on the Catholic Church's system of governance and its inadequacies. The clericalised structures have been shown to be prone to corruption. Left to itself, the church would not have engaged in any thorough examination or reform of itself. It took the institutions of State to bring the church leadership to account. What this indicates is that there is an urgent need to reform the structures of power in the church so that lay people, and especially women, share real power at every level of governance, especially at the top levels, that there be a more democratic input into church governance. The system of absolute power of bishops is unsatisfactory in an advanced age where in the wider world among the advanced nations, power is vested in various levels of society. Since the conviction of Cardinal George Pell in December and the lifting of the media ban on Tuesday last, legal commentators have advocated that the church needs an independent office like the Attorney-General's office. The church needs an instituted system of checks and balances on power.

Presently, the church is structured in a mediaeval monarchical system. Bishops are still referred to as "Princes" of the church. The power structures have unaccountability structured into them, all power being at the top of this monarchical system. Checks and balances on this power come from outside the church only when criminality is suspected or established, as evinced by the Royal Commission into Child Sexual Abuse. However, non-criminal abuse can be, and is exercised in the church.

A more democratic structuring of the church needs to be established with checks and balances which resemble the best institutions of the secular democracies.

The mediaeval practices such as the kissing of the Bishop's Ring, mediaeval trappings such as the Cappa Magna and other such ostentation, mediaeval titles such as Your Eminence, Your Grace, My Lord, and even the title of the Bishop's Palace all need to be discontinued and relegated to the pages of history. The people need to be recognised as brothers and sisters among a pilgrim people who are baptised in Christ and gifted with the Holy Spirit, and not treated as subjects who are expected to be docile.

WHAT FILLS YOUR HEART?

LUKE 6:39-45

In our age when words are getting cheaper, today's Word of God challenges us to regain the power of the spoken and written word. We are also challenged to see Jesus as the "Word" of God. To give your word is to give your own self. That is what God has done for us. God has given us Jesus, the Son, as the final and definitive word.

Images and parables are drawn from everyday life to make the teaching very direct and immediate. We hear the lesson of the sieve that strains out the rubbish, the potter's kiln that tests the potter's skill, the orchard where trees are judged by the fruit they bear. It is so easy to see the defects in someone else and yet remain unaware of our own defects.


'Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and not notice the plank in your own?' Jesus calls these people hypocrites. He attacks pretence. It is so easy to be critical of others and condemn them. We are being asked to look more closely at ourselves. We need to observe just how blind we can be to our own faults. All the places, people and things around us can speak to us and reveal God to us – if only we have eyes to see and ears to hear.

Jesus came to transform our common human values. These parables reinforce the message in Jesus' sermon that we have heard over the past couple of weeks. They are directed to the disciples and speak of their ministry to the poor and the hungry, to the sad and the despised.

The final statement goes to a person's heart. We are being asked to look into our own hearts and discover ourselves. This is

reflected in Ecclesiasticus: "The defects of a man appear in his talk. ... Do not praise a man before he has spoken, since this is the test of men." What have you discovered about yourself? Are you prepared to be judged by the words that flow out of your own heart?








PLENARY COUNCIL 2020 - THREE DAYS TO GO
