Dear Parish Family,

Weddings come in all shapes and sizes these days, but most still gather their friends and family and enjoy an elaborate celebration. It seems it was quite similar in the time of Jesus. The wedding feast of Cana saw Jesus turn water into wine so that the celebration could continue. The abundance of God's generosity was evident as Jesus provided between 120 and 180 gallons of the best wine! Some party! Weddings were celebrations for the entire community, and running out of wine was a social embarrassment and a bad omen for the marriage. In today's parable, the fact that the invited guests were not interested indicates their lack of respect for the king in the story. Jesus addressed this story to the chief priests and elders of the people and in keeping with other similar kingdom parables the king rejects these important guests and invites others in their place. This rejection of the religious establishment of the day still carries the same threat today and prompts the question for our own prayer and reflection: have we become too focused on our own goodness, our own religious practice or our own wants and desires so as to miss the invitation to God's abundant feast of life? Is our church too self-serving, worried about its own reputation more than the needs of the poor and marginalised?

Interestingly, the wedding garment was a common Jewish image for works of generosity expected of every faithful person. The man found to be lacking a wedding garment is therefore presumed to be a mean and selfish person. Such a person has no place at the wedding feast of the king. In the words of St Paul in his letter to the Colossians: "clothe yourselves in sincere compassion, kindness and humility, gentleness and patience... over all these clothes, to keep them together and complete them, put on love." This is the wedding garment we strive for.
